<p>Eight papers (plus an introduction) were presented to the workshop. In addition to the Abstracts, the papers were submitted to the Ceelbas website. Three doctoral or post doctoral students presented, the remainder being academics. There were paper-givers from Moscow, Jena, Budapest, Bremen, Scotland, and others from England. The papers were organised under three headings: Elites and Identity, Economic elites and their Impact and States and Identities. The full programme is attached.</p> <p>Nine speakers participated in the programme and there thirteen registered attendees, ten of whom were post graduates working in this area, participants were drawn from universities mainly outside Cambridge. The full programme as well as a list of attendees is attached.</p>

3. Achievement of stated aims and objectives

Please summarise how the stated aims and objectives of the activities proposed have been achieved and how these have helped to further the aims and objectives of CEELBAS.

The papers covered comparatively and conceptually the ways that elites shaped identity formation in post Soviet space with particular reference to exogenous elites.

Time was available for all present to socialise and make contacts. This is important for students working on different aspects of the subject who are located in different universities.

A notable element of the workshop was the presence of speakers from East and West Europe who brought a continental dimension to the discussion and widened the range of contacts for those studying this topic. This was particularly important as the speakers from Russia, Hungary and (former) East Germany were able to discuss research projects which had recently been completed.

The participants included students and lecturers in international studies, area studies, politics and sociology.

Agreement has been reached with the editor of Europe-Asia Studies to consider the papers from this and the next workshop for a special issue of the journal (expected date of publication 2011). The Editor of Europe-Asia Studies attended the workshop and referees have been appointed to consider the papers for publication.

Study of the returned 'Event Evaluation Form' showed that nearly all participants ranked the workshop either very good just a few gave a rank of (4).

Overall the workshop fulfilled its objectives.

4. Outcomes

Please indicate the outcomes and 'value for money' of activities carried out.

Nine papers were produced and were circulated before the workshop, twenty-three people attended the workshop. A 'special issue' of Europe-Asia Studies will include the presented papers (subject to peer review). These will constitute teaching materials for students and interested parties. It is hoped that the workshop will encourage work on the relationship between forms of identity, elites and political activity. There seems to be little work on these subjects in UK, though much in Europe..

Papers have also been made available on the internet.
